Your letter of the 19th was
received yesterday afternoon. We looked
for you home Monday and Tuesday
nights. Monday night your father
went to the train, Tuesday night
he wanted to go and see Tyndall's
performances, so Ben Woodhull went
to the train. If you have fully decided
that you cannot study any more
this year, I should think the sooner
you came home the better, unless it
is on account of having your throat
burned, and at the rate Dr Ward
is making at it, it will take a
long time yet. Perhaps Dr Davis
would be just as competent to
treat it as he is. I have not
seen Aunt since I received

your last. I don't think they will
be down Sunday. George said he
hardly thought he could get away
on account of it being fair week
and extra work to do. George
and Frank both have colds. Fred
took his girl to the races yesterday
afternoon and to the pavilion in
the evening. Emma & I went to the
pavilion last night. I have not
been out since Monday. Charlie
Abbott's wife and child are at Mrs
Phillip's. The boy looks just like
Charlie. I send enclosed a five dollar
greenback, and unless you are
coming home immediately, write
as soon as you receive this.

Aunt has been knitting on your
big mitts, but says if you are
coming home you will not need
it so soon. They have not got
into their new house yet and
